IFPB Welcomes New Board Members!

We are proud to welcome three colleagues to our Board of Directors. Our board is a committed and active group with close connections to the organization and our work. Each of these new board members has worked with IFPB in the past and has committed to do so in new and meaningful ways:

- Reverend Sandra R. Mackie is a master level counselor, an ordained pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and is trained to name and resolve congregational conflicts. Sandra chairs the Middle East Justice and Peace Group of South Central Pennsylvania and is a member of various NGO's including the Lutheran Peace Fellowship. Her passion is peacemaking in the tradition of Jesus and other great religious leaders.
- Rami Natsheh is a financial analyst originally from the city of Hebron in Palestine. Rami holds a BA from Hebron University and a Masters in Business Administration from Alaska Pacific University. He has volunteered with the Resource Center for Nonviolence and the Fellowship of Reconciliation, and has worked for the United Nations in the West Bank. He currently works for an investment company in Anchorage, Alaska.
- Shakeel Syed is the Executive Director of the *Islamic Shura Council*, a federation of Mosques and Muslim organizations in Southern California. Shakeel speaks frequently and has also written on issues related to Muslims and Islam. He joined an IFPB delegation in 2007 and co-led a delegation in 2009. He also serves the board of *US Campaign to End the Israeli Occupation*, the *ACLU of Southern California*, and currently chairs *Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice* in LA.

Expanding our Circle and Linking Struggles

IFPB to Organize and Send African Heritage Delegation in 2011

In July 2011, Interfaith Peace-Builders will send our first **African Heritage Delegation** to Israel/Palestine. The delegation will include activists, artists, community leaders and others of African descent who share a commitment to peace and justice in Israel/Palestine. It will raise awareness, heighten activism, and further link struggles between African Heritage communities in the US and Palestinians and Israelis. The delegation will be led by IFPB Board member **Gerald Lenoir** and University of Florida professor **Zoharah Simmons**.

Interfaith Peace-Builders has long focused on engaging a diversity of voices in our movements. In addition to our efforts to recruit widely on each delegation, this delegation builds on earlier focused delegations with Muslim activists in 2002 and *American Friends Service Committee's Third World Coalition* in 2007. Like the *Third World Coalition* delegation, this summer's African Heritage delegation will overlap with another delegation – so that activists on both trips can learn from each other as well as from the Israelis and Palestinians they meet.

Here are 5 reasons why we are excited about sending this delegation now:

1. The South Africa Analogy

Many prominent South Africans, among them Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Ronnie Kasrils, have compared Israel's system of segregation in the West Bank and Gaza Strip to the Apartheid once practiced in South Africa.

In 2005, Palestinian Civil Society launched a movement of nonviolent direct action explicitly modeled on the struggle against Apartheid and called for international solidarity to take the form of boycott, divestment and sanctions (BDS). **The Palestinian Unified Call for BDS**, signed by over 200 Palestinian organizations, is "inspired by the struggle of South Africans against Apartheid and in the spirit of international solidarity, moral consistency and resistance to injustice and oppression."



This Palestinian call also has been endorsed by rising numbers of Israelis and thousands of others around the world. African Heritage communities bring important experience gained in the movements against segregation in the United States and Apartheid in South Africa which those working on Israel/Palestine can further learn from and adopt.

2. Existing Efforts In African Heritage Communities



The African Heritage Delegation will build upon and strengthen existing efforts in African Heritage communities. African Heritage organizations and individuals are among the leaders of the growing movement for a just peace in Israel/Palestine. The delegation will build upon their work and help create the conditions to further strengthen and diversify efforts to improve US policy and achieve an Israeli-Palestinian peace based on justice.

The delegation will also build additional connections between African Americans and community leaders in Palestine/Israel. In this way, the delegation is a continuation of the efforts of the US Campaign to End the Israeli Occupation whose **Letter to Black America** was signed by prominent members of African Heritage communities.

3. The Opposition Is Engaging African Heritage Communities

In recent years, organizations supporting the status quo of Israeli occupation and continued conflict have stepped up their efforts to engage African Americans in the United States. The American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC) has been at the forefront of these efforts.

AIPAC boasts that "as part of its outreach program, AIPAC is seeking to build relationships with key leaders in the

African American community." To this end, it has organized its own delegations to Israel, introducing African Heritage leaders to Israeli politicians and hoping to build strong political support for Israeli political interests. As with most AIPAC trips, the delegates are not encouraged to travel to Palestinian communities, meet Palestinians, or even to build connections with Israeli activists working for a just peace.

Given this reality, IFPB's African Heritage Delegation will fill a needed void. The delegation will help tell other sides of the story by privileging the voices of Palestinians and Israelis working for peace and justice, touring areas impacted by occupation and colonization, and meeting with under-represented communities in Palestine/Israel (including African-Palestinians and Jews of Color).

4. The Stakes Are High

Every day that the Israeli occupation of Palestinian lands and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict continues more lives are lost and more insecurity is sown across the globe. The land of Israel/Palestine holds importance on numerous levels. It plays a crucial role in the game of geo-politics in the region which has become the focus for United States foreign policy; it is a land that holds deep religious meaning for the world's three largest monotheistic religions; and it is a place where colonialism has continued even through the age of decolonization.

Since 2000, more than 6,400 Palestinians and 800 Israelis have died in this conflict. That includes more than 1,300 Palestinian children and 120 Israeli children. Israel's occupation has sown great hardship throughout Palestinian communities who face soaring levels of malnutrition, poverty and psychological trauma. Israelis also live in great insecurity, which has contributed to the further militarization of the region. Clearly,



we must all do more to rectify this situation. The African Heritage delegation aims to start here, at home in the United States, by contributing substantively to the domestic movement for peace and justice in Israel/Palestine.

5. Our Partners Asked



Interfaith Peace-Builders partners and allies in African Heritage communities and the Palestinian and Israeli peace and justice movements asked us to organize this delegation. This initiative is a result of long-running and in-depth conversations and strategic considerations. IFPB brings 10 years of experience organizing 35 delegations to Israel/Palestine, bringing more than 550 people to see the region first-hand. Our delegates have benefited from IFPB's unique Education and Advocacy Program and have become integral parts of the US-based movement for Israeli-Palestinian peace and justice.

Participants in the African Heritage Delegation will benefit from IFPB's experience and expertise. Our partners have called for it, and now we aim to deliver. The time is ripe and the need is more urgent than ever. **Learn more about this delegation at: www.ifpb.org/africanheritage**

2010 / Year in Review

In 2010, Interfaith Peace-Builders put in motion plans that were hatched nearly two years ago. It was then that our board and staff set the strategic goal of hiring a third staff member to supplement the work of full-time staff Mike Daly and Jacob Pace and half-time Senior Fellow Joe Groves. Along with our staff, our programs also expanded in our tenth year of delegation-based education and advocacy:

>>> Interfaith Peace-Builders' 2nd Grassroots Advocacy Training & Lobby Day brings nearly 200 people to Washington DC; the event is endorsed by 18 other organizations in the peace and justice movement • IFPB's Board of Directors agrees to ambitious Strategic Plan and lays out quarterly benchmarks to success in the 2011 fiscal year • IFPB launches "Support Interfaith Peace-Builders," our presence on Facebook Causes • 29 people join IFPB's 33rd delegation in May; the third co-sponsored by the National Peace Foundation • IFPB's Board of Directors grows when Sandra Mackie, Rami Natsheh, and Shakeel Syed join • 21 people join IFPB's 34th delegation in July; with more than half under 30 years old • IFPB hires Emily Siegel as new Delegations Coordinator • Nasser Abu Farha of the Palestinian Fair Trade Association is hosted by IFPB at events throughout northern Ohio • IFPB wins a \$2,500 challenge grant by raising \$5,000 in six months through new and unique methods • 26 people join IFPB's 35th delegation, bringing our total since 2001 to more than 550 delegates • IFPB delegates in 2010 reach tens of thousands through media events, public speaking and organizing >>>
