IFPB Delegates Find Power in Regional Networks

Ohio Group Paves the Way for Others Around the Country!

In the past five years, the number of people who have joined Interfaith Peace-Builders delegations has doubled. As the organization grows exponentially, we are responding to the good work of so many delegates by taking new steps to foster **IFPB regional networks**.

Regional networks facilitate delegate-to-delegate contact and lead new opportunities for delegates to pursue education and advocacy for peace and justice in Palestine/Israel. They are about strengthening the IFPB community, and do so by better connecting groups of delegates to share experience and skills, and to further the education and advocacy work which IFPB delegations inspire.

As IFPB regional networks spring up around the country, we hope that each will recruit potential delegates, help support them on return, and help us identify resources to make it all possible. **Most importantly, delegates can use the networks to learn from each other and share experiences, skills, and organizing strategies.**

The development of regional networks has already begun! In addition to germinations in Virginia, New England, and Los Angeles, there is a flourishing network in Ohio which began meeting and working together in 2010. The Ohio regional network has accumulated a great deal of experience from which others can learn.

There are **19** IFPB delegates active in the Ohio network, including **6** who joined IFPB delegations in 2011. The group has organized presentations for returning delegates, hosted speakers from Palestine, and supported delegates' work in local communities throughout the state.

This is a good way to get ideas about new projects to support nonviolent peace efforts in the area."

Recently, I lobbied for the divestment resolution at the National Meeting of Black Methodists for Church Renewal. The body voted unanimously to endorse the divestment resolution to give it "muscle" at the United Methodist Church General Conference."

IFPB Delegates Say: "Injustice Anywhere Is a Threat to Justice Everywhere" Palestine and the African American Experience Event Draws Hundreds at Occupy AIPAC Summit and Mobilization

On March 2-6, hundreds converged on Washington to stand against war and occupation. Organized by our friends at CODEPINK, the **Occupy AIPAC** summit and mobilization raised a voice of opposition to violent policies pursued by the American-Israel Public Affairs Committee and its allies.

As a co-sponsor of the event, Interfaith Peace-Builders organized a unique panel featuring participants on IFPB's 2011 African Heritage Delegation to Palestine/Israel and other African American delegates. Speakers highlighted the importance of solidarity with Palestinians resisting Israeli occupation and colonization, and problematized AIPAC's recruitment of African American clergy and students at Historically Black Colleges.

10 Awarded Grants to Join Summer Delegations

In 2011 nearly 1 in 3 IFPB delegates where under the age of 30. In 2010, young people made up nearly 40% of all delegates. IFPB has always looked to cultivate young leadership, and has done so, in one way, through scholarships allowing young people to join IFPB delegations.

As part of these efforts, we have awarded scholarships to 10 students and youth who will be joining one of our two summer delegations. Announcing the Scott Kennedy Memorial Scholarship Fund

Scott Kennedy, the Chair of Interfaith Peace-Builders Board and one of the founders of our program, passed away on November 19, 2011. He left many things as a legacy to his long years of work for peace and justice in Palestine/Israel.

Scott's advocacy included tireless efforts to bring as many people as possible to meet with Palestinian and Israeli peace-builders. He often raised money to bring young and low-income activists on the delegations he led.

In honor of Scott's efforts, Interfaith Peace-Builders is rechristening our scholarship fund in his honor, so that we can continue the important work that he pioneered.

\$5 a Month Is All It Takes to Build This Movement!

A personal note:

I'm not sure how many times I've headed out my front door, turned left, and wandered into the *Sunrise Deli* down the street from my home in San Francisco. *Sunrise* is owned by a Palestinian family from Jerusalem and makes the best falafel outside of Palestine (in my opinion). The family now has restaurants in Berkeley and closer to downtown, but the one on Irving at 22nd Avenue is the original, and that's where I make my pilgrimage.

In the morning I might order several falafel and a piece of ka'ak (the delicious sesame ring bread that is unique to the Jerusalem region); in the afternoon, I order a falafel sandwich. Whatever I choose, I usually pay no more than \$5 (plus tip).

All of us, almost every day, spend at least \$5 for lunch. But what would happen if each of us reading this newsletter donated just \$5 a month to Interfaith Peace-Builders?

With just \$5 a month we could build our work in new and important ways. For instance, we could send more youth and community leaders to Palestine/Israel; we could develop additional regional networks of IFPB delegates and train them in activism and advocacy skills; we could bring speakers from Palestine/Israel to communities across the country; we could invest more in the movement we are building here in North America to bring peace and justice to Palestine/Israel; and more!

You are an essential piece of this work. All it takes is the cost of one falafel sandwich each month.
