Young Voices Build a Lasting Movement

One of the strong commitments informing Interfaith Peace-Builders' work is to bring increasingly diverse voices into the movement for peace and justice in Palestine/Israel.

To that end, IFPB initiated the African Heritage Delegation program, has sought out unique and diverse partnerships, and continues to disperse increasingly larger sums through the *Scott Kennedy Memorial Scholarship Fund*. In 2013 IFPB granted \$11,200 in scholarship funding, helping to make a delegation possible for 25 people.

We have also increased outreach and recruiting among younger audiences, including college students and community activists. As a result, one in every three delegates on Interfaith Peace-Builders delegations in 2013 was under the age of 30.

These figures are not important for their own right. IFPB's goal is to aid the growing movement for peace in Palestine/Israel. In building a movement, we need new activists and new energy.

New Board Members Bring Strength and Experience

We are pleased to welcome five new member of Interfaith Peace-Builders Board of Directors, bringing our Board to the capacity of 15 extraordinary individuals. Each new Board Member brings unique strengths, abilities, and experience to our work:



Ilise Benshushan Cohen has her PhD in Social and Cultural Anthropology focused on Mizrahi Jews and their experiences of war and eviction in Israel, and is a long time scholar-activist on the Middle East, particularly on Israel/Palestine and Mizrahi Jews. She is a Sephardic Jew herself, an Atlanta native, and has lived and worked in Israel with Jews and Palestinians. This is Ilise's second stint on Interfaith Peace-Builders' board and is past board chair of Interfaith Peace Builders. She has has led multiple IFPB delegations to Israel/Palestine meeting with nonviolent and human rights activists. Ilise is also a founder of the Jewish Voice for Peace chapter in Atlanta.

Manal Fakhoury is a Palestinian American, born in Anabta, Palestine; her family immigrated to the US when she was 6 years old. Manal earned her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University of Southern California and her MBA from Webster University. She is the founder and president of Fakhoury Leadership International, and Co-Director of Citizen Diplomacy Initiative, an organization founded to encourage American, Israeli and Palestinian people to acquire a consciousness and understanding of one another as individuals, as members of their communities, as citizens of their countries and as part of the family of nations, through the formation of three-way sister city relationships in an effort to end the occupation. She



and her family travel to Palestine regularly, are IFPB delegates, and have volunteered in several humanitarian efforts. Manal serves on a dozen boards and is very active in her community in Ocala, Florida. She and her husband Riadh have five beautiful children, who are also very active.



Adam Horowitz is co-editor of the website Mondoweiss, a news website devoted to covering American foreign policy in the Middle East, chiefly from a progressive Jewish perspective. Prior to Mondoweiss, Horowitz was Director of the Israel/Palestine Program for the American Friends Service Committee. He is the co-editor (along with Philip Weiss and Lizzy Ratner) of *The Goldstone Report: The Legacy of the Landmark Investigation of the Gaza Conflict* (Nation Books). Horowitz has a master's degree in Near Eastern Studies from New York University. He has led previous IFPB delegations and co-organized several partnership delegations while on staff at the American Friends Service Committee.

Lorraine LeBlanc is an actress and school volunteer now living in her hometown of New Orleans. Her interest in Middle East peace grew from having Lebanese grandparents who immigrated to Mexico. Her son also has a Jewish grandmother so her involvement is urgently personal in addition to being grounded in an abiding concern for social and political justice. Lorraine traveled to Israel/Palestine with an Interfaith Peace-Builders delegation in 2009 and the experience cemented her desire to participate in achieving justice and peace for everyone living in the region. She is a graduate of the University of New Orleans and Penn State. She has spent over twenty years working in the areas of fundraising and strategic planning for social service and arts-related non- profits.





Lisa Nessan is a Jewish American from the San Francisco Bay Area. Lisa first visited Israel when she was 16 and later studied there in 1997-98. From 2002 to 2005 she lived and worked in the West Bank documenting and supporting grassroots nonviolent resistance against the occupation. Lisa has conducted nonviolence trainings for international volunteers working with the International Solidarity Movement and coordinated with Israeli, Palestinian and international organizations in Israel and the West Bank to facilitate support for Palestinian communities faced with Israeli military and settler violence. She has been leading delegations to the region for IFPB and Global Exchange since 2001.

You Can Join Bob and Sally Follow These Simple Steps to Put Interfaith Peace-Builders in Your Will

Perhaps the easiest form of planned giving is a bequest – a gift through your will. A donor can arrange a gift of a specific amount, a percentage, or all or part of the residue of your estate. Ask your attorney for advice or use this suggested wording for a bequest to Interfaith Peace-Builders:

For the bequest of a certain sum:

I give, devise and bequeath to Interfaith Peace-Builders, currently located at 1628 16th Street NW, Washington, DC 20009, the sum of \$_____ for its general purposes.

For a bequest of a percentage of the estate:

I give, devise and bequeath to Interfaith Peace-Builders, currently located at 1628 16th Street NW, Washington, DC 20009, ______ percent of the rest, residue and remainder of my estate for its general purposes.

For a contingent bequest:

If any of the above-named beneficiaries should predecease me, I hereby bequeath her/his share to Interfaith Peace-Builders, currently located at 1628 16th Street NW, Washington, DC 20009, to be used for its general purposes.
