

IT TAKES AN ENTIRE DELEGATION... Presbyterian Delegation & Divestment

On June 20, 2014, the Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA) voted in favor of divesting \$21 million from Caterpillar, Motorola Solutions, and Hewlett-Packard. The vote at the PCUSA General Assembly in Detroit followed a week of careful deliberation and a decade-long corporate engagement and discernment process.

There is no doubt this as an historic decision. The PCUSA voted in 1985 to divest from firms operating in South Africa and the action helped the South African anti-Apartheid movement build traction. We hope the gains won in South Africa can be replicated in Palestine/Israel.

The divestment vote also shows one way IFPB's work translates into concrete victories. More than 65 delegates are Presbyterian, including 29 who traveled in January with the IFPB and Presbyterian Peace Fellowship Delegation. Many worked around the clock to ensure that the PCUSA acted with conscience and with justice.

IFPB's 50th delegation returned to the US days before the Israeli government began a collective punishment of the West Bank and Gaza Strip under pretense of responding to the kidnapping of three Israeli settlers. Several returned delegates were shocked that the incredible community leaders and activists they had just met were being targeted in the July raids in the West Bank and sprung into action to show solidarity from the US.

Many of our 50th delegation participants, as well as IFPB's 950+ delegates, also organized in response to the assault on Gaza. To name just a few of our delegates' efforts:

- Nancy Hernandez, an Oakland organizer and delegate on the IFPB/Third World Coalition delegation, worked with 11 artists to create a mural in solidarity with Palestine.
- Cathy Sultan, current IFPB board member initiated an effort to fundraise amongst IFPB delegates to support the Middle East Childrens Alliance and the family of Dr. Mona al-Farra who lost 9 members of her family to Israeli shelling.
- Naomi Dann, who joined IFPB's 50th delegation and is a current fellow at Jewish Voice for Peace, was arrested for joining an #IfNotNow protest in the lobby of the New York offices of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations.
- Kristian Bailey, writer for Ebony and delegate on our 47th delegation, initiated a vital statement- Black Progressive Call for Action on Palestine.
- Sharif Zakout, Youth Program Coordinator for AROC, has been organizing youth in the Bay Area and played an integral part in the Block the Boat actions which stopped an Israeli container ship from unloading at the Port of Oakland.

Overall, more than 70 delegates reported 194 activities they have contributed to in at least 26 states in the last six weeks. That includes at least 15 online media articles, 38 print media hits, and 23 radio or TV interviews. There were at least 65 organizing initiatives (local protests, BDS actions, etc.) that former delegates played a key role in, and too many mentions of participating in local demonstrations to count. Imagine how much more work has been done by our other 920+ former delegates.

In August, IFPB sent our first ever delegate newsletter - focusing on the Gaza Strip. Delegates and supporters alike have asked us for better ways to stay connected with each other, with advocacy work, and with resources for continued learning. In 2012, Reverend Sekou traveled to Palestine/Israel with Interfaith Peace-Builders and the Dorothy Cotton Institute. From Ferguson to Palestine, communities of color are facing the same tear gas and Israeli trained armed forces. Now is the time to move beyond drawing parallels, to facilitating connections.





In this moment, the importance of IFPB's *third* African Heritage Delegation to Palestine/Israel is evident. This year's applicants comprise a cohort of 26 people from across the US and possess a range of political experience within the Civil Rights movement tradition, the Black Power movement and the most recent movement against mass incarceration. This diverse group includes youth and elders, media-makers, writers, artists and community organizers. It is truly a group of exceptional individuals, poised to make a difference.

Past African Heritage delegates have made a tremendous impact both within their local communities and with their contributions to the US Palestine solidarity movement. The 30+ delegates from the 2011 and 2012 delegations have given interviews or written articles and have issued or signed timely statements in support of Palestinian rights.

Many have brought the delegation experience and eyewitness to their communities through presentations and local organizing; further inspiring future efforts to connect with Palestinian communities and groups and create campaigns that affect communities of color in the US and in Palestine/Israel.
